RENEWED EMERGENCY RELIEF  
(Gov. Code §68115)

Pursuant to the authority provided under California Government Code Section 68115, as granted in the March 30, April 29 and May 15, 2020 orders of Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, Chair of the Judicial Council of California, and as stated in Emergency Rules of Court 1-13, adopted by the Judicial Council on April 6, 2020 (as amended April 20, 2020):

This Court **HEREBY FINDS AND ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:**

1. The court may hold sessions anywhere in the county, including in correctional and juvenile detention facilities from 5/16/2020 to 6/13/2020, inclusive.  
(Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(1).);

1           2.           Any judge of the court may extend by up to ninety (90) days the duration  
2 of any temporary restraining order that would otherwise expire during the state of emergency  
3 related to the COVID-19 pandemic, where the emergency conditions prevent the court from  
4 conducting proceedings to determine whether a permanent order should be entered. (Emergency  
5 Rule of Court, rule 8 (b)(2) – (b)(3), as amended April 20, 2020.) Specifically, any temporary  
6 restraining order or gun violence emergency protective order, issued or set to expire during the  
7 state of emergency related to the COVID-19 pandemic must remain in effect for a period of time  
8 that the court determines is sufficient to allow for a hearing on the long-term order to occur, for  
9 up to ninety (90) days. (Emergency Rule of Court, rule 8 (b)(2), as amended April 20, 2020.)  
10 Additionally, any criminal protective order, subject to this rule, set to expire during the state of  
11 emergency related to the COVID-19 pandemic must be automatically extended for a period of 90  
12 days, or until the matter can be heard, whichever occurs first. (Emergency Rule of Court, rule 8  
13 (b)(3), as amended April 20, 2020.) Upon the filing of a request to renew a restraining order  
14 after hearing, that is set to expire during the state of emergency related to the COVID-19  
15 pandemic, the current restraining order after hearing must remain in effect until a hearing on the  
16 renewal can occur, for up to ninety (90) days from the date of expiration. (Emergency Rule of  
17 Court, rule 8 (b)(4), as amended April 20, 2020.)

18           3.           The court extends the time period provided in section 859b of the Penal  
19 Code for the holding of a preliminary examination from ten (10) court days to not more than  
20 thirty (30) court days. (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(9) and Order of Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-  
21 Sakaue, dated March 30, 2020, sec. A1.)

22           4.           If the court determines it is necessary, the court may extend the time  
23 period provided in section 825 of the Penal Code within which a defendant charged with a felony  
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1 offense must be taken before a magistrate from 48 hours to not more than seven (7) days. (Gov.  
2 Code, § 68115(a)(8) and Order of Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, dated March 30, 2020,  
3 sec. A2.)  
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5 5. The court extends the time period provided in section 1382 of the Penal  
6 Code within which a trial must be held by a maximum of ninety (90) days. (Orders of Chief  
7 Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, dated March 30, 2020, sec. A3, and April 29, 2020.) This order  
8 applies only to cases in which the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from 3/16/20 to  
9 6/15/20, inclusive.  
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11 6. If the court determines it is necessary, the court may extend the time  
12 period provided in section 313 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken  
13 into custody pending dependency proceedings must be released from custody to not more than  
14 seven (7) days. (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11).) This order applies only to minors for whom the  
15 statutory deadline otherwise would expire from 5/16/2020 to 6/13/2020, inclusive.  
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17 7. If the court determines it is necessary, the court may extend the time  
18 period provided in section 315 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a minor taken  
19 into custody pending dependency proceedings must be given a detention hearing to not more  
20 than seven (7) days. (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(11).) This order applies only to minors for whom  
21 the statutory deadline otherwise would expire from 5/16/2020 to 6/13/2020, inclusive.  
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23 8. If the court determines it is necessary, the court may extend the time  
24 periods provided in sections 632 and 637 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a  
25 minor taken into custody pending wardship proceedings and charged with a felony offense must  
26 be given a detention hearing or rehearing to not more than seven (7) days. (Gov. Code,  
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1 § 68115(a)(11).) This order applies only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise  
2 would expire from 5/16/2020 to 6/13/2020, inclusive.

3 9. If the court determines it is necessary, the court may extend the time  
4 period provided in section 334 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a  
5 juvenile dependency petition must be held by not more than seven (7) days. (Gov. Code,  
6 § 68115(a)(12).) This order applies only to minors for whom the statutory deadline otherwise

7 would expire from 5/16/2020 to 6/13/2020, inclusive.  
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9 10. If the court determines it is necessary, the court may extend the time  
10 period provided in section 657 of the Welfare and Institutions Code within which a hearing on a  
11 wardship petition for a minor charged with a felony offense must be held by not more than  
12 fifteen (15) days. (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(12).) This order applies only to minors for whom the  
13 statutory deadline otherwise would expire from 5/16/2020 to 6/13/2020, inclusive.  
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17 **IT IS SO ORDERED.**
